Mayor Riley introduced Officer Ivol and explained that he will be replacing Officer Cook who will work his final shift on May 18th. Officer Ivol attended Upper St. Clair High School and Indiana University of Pennsylvania for his bachelor's degree and his Act 120 certification.

<u>COMMENT:</u> Council President Boyd added that an additional \$35,000 was raised by the extended Masciantonio family whose ancestor was one of the original builders of the Stone Shelter. All funds will go to the rehabilitation of both the Stone and Monarch Shelters.

- E. Public Safety and Fire Dept. / EMS Report In April 2024, there were 121 ambulance calls and 22 fire calls.
- F. President's Report Thanked the Administrative staff for their work on the 5k which raised \$27,000. A \$5,000 grant from Active Allegheny helped in off-setting expenses and the Allegheny County Executive Sara Innamorato gave closing remarks.
- 7. <u>Manager's Report</u> Submitted information to PADEP shared energy managers. Once they have completed their report, we will receive recommendations for lowering our energy costs for the Borough Building and public works buildings.

We have submitted an application to Chris Deluzio Community Grant for police technology and scoping forms for three 2024 ARLE grant applications for two solar-powered, school zone speed limit flashing warning signs for Washington Avenue; Preemptive green lights for emergency responders for possibly nine intersections; and crosswalk signal replacement for eleven intersections.

Received grant reimbursement in the amount of \$98,170 from the PCCD for police technology.

Three radar feedback signs have been ordered – two for Forsythe Road and one for Pennsbury. The cost will be paid with reimbursements from our 2022 ARLE grant award.

Carnegie thanks John Mayo, Larry Mayo, Shane Franklin, and Public Works for restoring our historic watchtower landmark located on the corner of Mansfield and Chartiers.

Bids are being prepared for the East Main Street bridge repair project.

Thank you to the Carnegie Shade Tree Commission for their volunteer clean-up efforts of the 5K run/walk route.

Four grant applications were submitted through Senate appropriations. Two to Senator Fetterman and two to Senator Casey for office and police technology.

8. <u>Mayor's Report</u> – In April 2024, there were 13 criminal arrests and citations, 139 traffic stops (38 on Forsythe Road), 33 traffic citations, 16 parking tickets, and 1,382 calls and self-initiated activity.

On May 18th, the Shade Tree Commission will be holding a planting and clean-up event from 9am-12pm. To volunteer for this and other Shade Tree events, please go to the Borough website. The Memorial Day parade will begin at 2pm on May 26th. Carlynton students will celebrate graduation on May 31st at Honus Wagner Stadium.

Dog-a-Palooza returns on June 2nd from 10am-2pm. The event is hosted by Carlynton graduate Cristy Crawshaw and is celebrating its 10th year. There will be food, vendors, low-cost vaccines for dogs, a bathing station, and a costume parade. The free summer lunches for students will be returning June 3rd –August

16th. Thank you to everyone who assisted with the planning of the 5k, volunteers came from the Administration Department, Police Department, Fire Department, Public Works, and Borough Council.

The first Crawl of the year kicked off on May 10th. Bon Journey performed, and a proclamation was read for Joanne Letcher who served as Executive Director of the CCDC for 11 years and was instrumental in rebuilding Carnegie.

9. Jr. Council Report (Angelika Pyvovar / Ella Snyder)

<u>Ella Snyder</u> – Students at Carlynton celebrated Teacher Appreciation week by cleaning and decorating break rooms. The Honor Society students will be cleaning up and planting flowers near the Fort Pitt Tunnel. The Junior High students had a dance last week which was well attended.

Students are currently completing standardized testing and AP exams. Lifeguard certifications were held in the High School pool and attended by people from all around Allegheny County. Money from this program benefits the swim team. Seniors are looking forward to graduation on May 31st and their picnic at Carnegie Park.

The Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program will be available June-November this year. More information can be found on the LifeSpan Senior Center website or in person. As a reminder the Shade Tree Commission will be planting this weekend on May 18th. In the Borough building lobby, there are photos from Bishop Canevin students, make sure to check that out. <u>CCDC</u> – Councilperson Lee spoke about the success of the first Crawl of the year and the importance of supporting the local businesses involved with these events. The Crawl is always the second Friday of the month from May-October.
